What the Flock?

The bird of the month for July is our Missouri State Bird, The Eastern Bluebird. Often thought to bring happiness and cheer, Eastern Bluebirds have a distinctive upbeat song, sounding like a quick, "churlee chur chur-lee" that brings joy to the ears. The Bluebird is a year-round resident of Missouri that prefers open habitats, such as fields, pastures and roadsides but also can be seen parks and yards.

The sky-blue head, back, and tail of the male, brings delight to the eyes of those lucky to catch a glimpse of these beauties. With a rusty red breast and white belly, they are cousins to the American Robin. The female is somewhat grayer than the male with a faint rusty breast and faint blue wings and tail. Males and females are similar in size ranging about 6-8 inches in length.

Bluebirds are cavity nesters and will use vacant woodpecker cavities, or nest boxes to set up their home, adding a soft lining to make it their own. The females typically have two broods a year laying 4-5 pale blue eggs. Bluebirds feed on insects and fruit, as well as live or dead mealworms (a favorite!). They will feed from shallow dishes placed in yards and visit suet feeders. They enjoy a good clean birdbath and especially one with moving water.

Bluebirds bring delight to the eyes and ears and getting to see one is sure to bring a smile.
